MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR & PRESIDENT

Dear Friends of the Foundation,

As history buffs will know, the Canada West Foundation was formed in 1971 after a conference in Lethbridge, Alta., explored the feasibility of forming one western province out of the four. Although it was obvious that a single political entity was not feasible, the organizers understood what we know so well today - the West can do more when it speaks with one voice. The Foundation remains committed to that objective today.

Two-and-a-half years ago, the Foundation reorganized as a truly pan-western think tank. Our reach extends from the prairie fields of Manitoba to the salmon fisheries of British Columbia. To realize our mandate, we travelled widely in 2014, holding events and giving speeches and presentations in Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon and Vancouver, as well as Edmonton and Calgary.

Our actions had impact. In Calgary, our Mexico energy event revealed to Canadian companies the tremendous opportunities awaiting them there, and companies responded. In Regina, we moderated a meeting of the three New West Partnership premiers and business leaders to resolve obstacles to getting western goods to international markets. In Manitoba, we conducted a "politics-in-full-sentences" discussion with Premier Greg Selinger. In British Columbia, our community dinner brought together leaders to discuss that province's connection with the broader West.

We published research on urban energy management, public support for development of the West's four major resource industries, skills gaps in our workforce, improving our trade infrastructure and understanding reforms to the Temporary Foreign Worker Program.

Convening leaders to have thoughtful discussions about the things that matter most to the West. Looking for practical solutions that policy makers and business leaders can act on today. Seeking ways the West can attain – and sustain – the prosperity and quality of life we value so highly. That's what drives us. That is why we remain so grateful for the ongoing support we receive.

It is also why we remain steadfastly optimistic that the West will meet the challenges it faces head on and succeed in a hyper-competitive global marketplace. The views of our members and supporters are vital to the ongoing dialogue. We encourage you to let us know what is on your mind.



Think GLOBAL Impact


On June 2, the Foundation convened more than 100 business leaders in Calgary for the Mexican government's first foreign presentation on energy reform. The Mexican government forged

The essential ingredient in renewed public support is real improvement in how companies perform 'on the ground' in communities directly affected by resource development.








