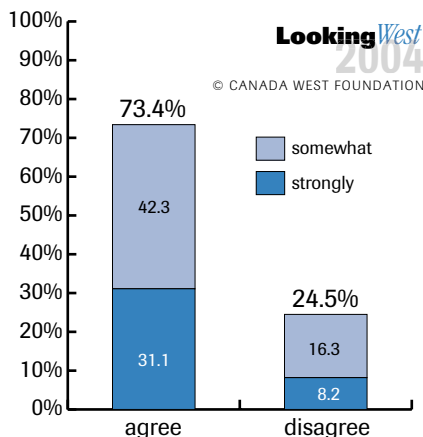
Canada-US Relations

The Looking West 2004 policy priorities data demonstrate four in ten (44.4%) Manitobans feel that improving Canada-US relations is a high priority for long-term provincial prosperity and quality of life, while one-third (34.0%) feels it is a medium priority. Two in ten feel it is either a low priority (16.2%) or not a priority (4.3%).

To further probe attitudes about the Canada-US relationship, Looking West 2004 survey respondents were asked two questions specific to trade and the economy. First, westerners were asked to rate their agreement with the statement, "Canada should pursue closer economic ties with the United States." Manitobans are quite positive in their response to this: three-quarters agree that stronger ties should be pursued, with one-third strongly agreeing.

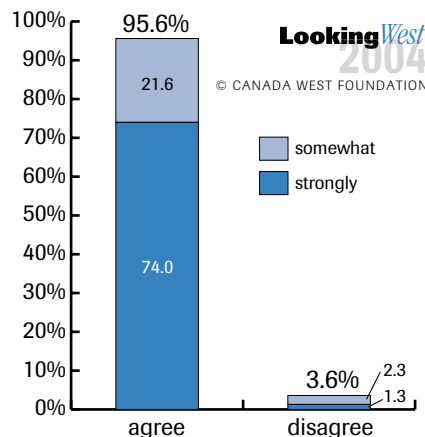
Respondents were also asked to rate their agreement with the statement, "Canada should make every effort to keep the Canada-US border open to Canadian trade." On this point, Manitobans are emphatic: 95.6% agree, with three-quarters agreeing strongly.

MB Respondents, 2004

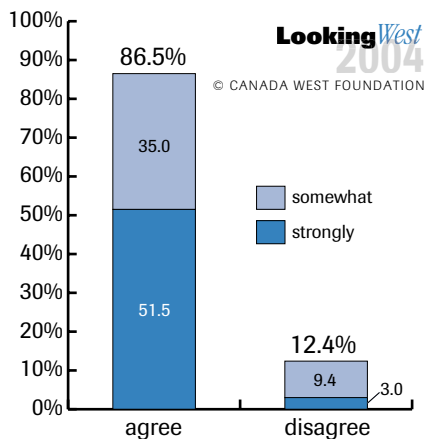


Canada should make every effort to keep the Canada-US border open to Canadian trade.

There has been a lot of debate in recent years about the quality of the Canada-US relationship. To assess attitudes about this, Looking West 2004 respondents were asked to rate their agreement with the statement, "The relationship between Canada and the United States has deteriorated over the past few years." Manitobans clearly think that the relationship has suffered: over eight in ten (86.5%) agree that it has deteriorated, with the majority (51.5%) agreeing strongly.

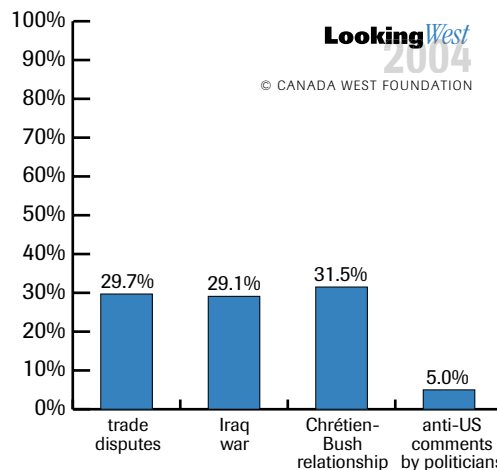
Respondents who agreed (strongly or somewhat) that the Canada-US relationship has deteriorated were asked a follow-up question: "Of the following reasons, which do you feel has most significantly contributed to a deterioration in Canada-US relations over the past few years? Canada-US trade disputes, such as softwood lumber and beef exports; differing positions on the Iraq war; poor personal relationship between Prime Minister Chretien and President Bush; anti-American comments by Canadian politicians." Manitobans are clearly divided on the cause of deterioration; while trade disputes is the cause cited by three in ten, another three in ten blame differing positions on the Iraq war and still another three in ten blame the poor personal relationship between former Prime Minister Chretien and President Bush. Only 5% blame anti-American comments by Canadian politicians.
